A message from your ...

HOA President, John Bernard:

Hi Fellow Cat Hollow Members,

It's great to see plants starting to grow, trees budding and the days getting longer. I'm pleased to announce that Evan Eppinger has been appointed to the Board. Evan has lived in Cat Hollow since 2017. He is a realtor with considerable experience with property management and has worked with many HOA communities. His experience will be very helpful as we move forward with the fining policy and updating our bylaws and ARC guidelines. Please join me in welcoming Evan to the Board.

The walkway between Almelo and Liberty Walk is scheduled to be completely refurbished the week of March 17 during the school break. The walkway will be closed during construction. Please plan accordingly. The walkway will be widened to 7'. We've chosen to concrete the walkway because of its durability and low maintenance. The ends will be flared to make it easier for pedestrians and the slope near Liberty Walk will become ADA compliant. The edges between the new path and concrete fences will be stone and mulch to match the O'Connor medians.

Urban Dirt is well underway completing phase 2 of our landscape upgrade project. You'll see them throughout the neighborhood refurbishing corners, entry islands and other common areas. They are also adding trellises to the butterfly garden on Liberty Walk to make the vining plants more visible. We've resolved the irrigation issues along O'Connor and are looking forward to a banner year for color and growth.

There are still a few other areas that are under discussion. We're reviewing alternative design options and proposals to find the best options. These areas include Bobcat, the Liberty Walk trail head and a few other smaller areas. We'll address these areas in the fall if we don't finalize designs and quotes before the spring planting season ends.

Maintenance on the monument signs is planned for the week of March 17. The signs will be cleaned so that all traces of graffiti will be removed and then they will be sealed to help defend against future vandalism. We've added more cameras near the monument signs to improve our ability to identify vandals. Thanks to Rob Rich for getting the cameras installed and monitoring notifications.

We still have one open position on both the ARC and Board. We hope that more members will come forward to volunteer to help continue to improve our neighborhood. The next Board meeting will be Wednesday, April 16 starting at 6:30 PM in the Community Center. We hope to see you there. We also welcome your feedback or suggestions to the Board on any topic through the Portal.



OCBS: DOG BITES 101

Would you know what to do if you suddenly came upon an aggressive, threatening dog? And what if you got bitten?

On "The Early Show", resident veterinarian Dr. Debbye Turner Bell offered important pointers on preventing -and treating -- dog bites. She also had words to the wise about keeping your dog from becoming aggressive.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, 4.7 million people are bitten by dogs in the United States each year, and one-in-five bites requires medical attention - some 800,000 a year. Not only that, but children are most at risk, especially those between the ages of 5 and 9 (as published on www.CBSnews. com).

WHY DOGS BITE

There are several reasons a dog will bite, and many of them have nothing to do with being mean. More often than not, a dog will bite out of fear, rather than aggression. Dogs that feel threatened, unsure, or challenged will respond by biting as a self-defense mechanism. Dogs that haven't been spayed or neutered may display aggressive behavior related to their sex drive. Dogs are territorial creatures and will protect their turf. So a dog might bite if its food, toys, or pups are bothered. A surprised dog will bite. If you approach a dog unexpectedly or he doesn't hear you coming, his instinct might be to bite out of fear. Dogs that haven't been properly behavior-trained and socialized are more likely to bite.

WAYS TO PREVENT AGGRESSION IN YOUR PET

1) Spay or neuter your animal. This is not only good for the health of your dog, it can decrease the dog's drive to roam, and compete for the affections of the opposite sex. Often, intact dogs (those that have not been spayed or neutered) are more territorial, aggressive and protective.

2) Avoid playing "tug of war" with a dog. Many dogs interpret this as aggression. If they "win," they feel empowered. If they feel threatened, they may try to retaliate.

3) Avoid "roughhousing" with, or other sudden movements toward the dog's owner. Many dogs will see this as an attack on their owner, and will attack you to defend the owner.

4) Socialize and behavior-train your dog.

5) Do not try to take food or toy away from a dog. NEVER bother a dog while he is eating. The most common situation where a dog bite occurs is while a dog is eating!

6) Have enough toys for your multiple dog household, so that the dogs don't have to share. They also should not share food and water bowls.

7) Do not allow your dog to roam unsupervised or offleash.



Springtime Irrigation Check

In addition to cleaning gutters and preparing planting beds, irrigation system inspection is essential for preparing your yard for spring. Before simply turning the system back on to run the last program it used in the fall, visually check it to ensure everything is functioning properly.

This way, when you start using it again you won't be caught off guard by high water bills, dying plants, or uneven coverage. When you test your irrigation system you are looking for problems that include:

- Sprinkler heads that aren't popping up maybe grass grew over the heads.
- Heads that are turned the wrong way and are spraying areas they shouldn't be (e.g. driveways, sidewalks, the house, or the fence).
- Leaking heads these should be replaced.
- Heads that are covered by shrubs or bushes.
- Areas of low water pressure.

Taking a little time now to inspect your irrigation system could help prevent unexpected yard problems as the year progresses.

- Cough
- Runny nose
