Mayor's Message Dan Reese



Welcome to the beginning of summer! In May, we will celebrate Cinco de Mayo (5th of course), Mother's Day (11th) and Memorial Day (26th).

The Parade Where Fiesta Began – Battle of Flowers. – May 2, 2025 Last month I put some Fiesta dates in my article, but missed arguably the most important event – the Battle of Flowers Parade. The Battle of Flowers website notes that since 1891, the Battle of Flowers Parade has been the pinnacle of

San Antonio's Fiesta celebration. A group of civic-minded women conceived the idea of a parade in front of the Alamo to honor the heroes that fought for Texas Independence. The Grand Marshals for this year's parade are the Josh Abbott Band. The Parade continues to be produced by women, all volunteers, who honor the legacy of their forebears.

Hiring and Projects

City Manager – The Council will select an executive search firm to conduct the process of identifying the next City Manager. After the firm is selected, they will take applications, review the qualifications of applicants, and provide the City Council recommendations on the candidates to consider. The City Council will then make decisions on interviews and make the final appointment of our new City Manager. We don't have a timeline, but I'm hopeful that process will be complete in June or July. At this time, our Finance Director, Natalia Witmer, is acting in the dual capacity of Finance and Interim City Manager and doing an excellent job.

Police Chief – The Council approved a team to do the initial screening of the Police Chief applicants. The team consisted of two active Police Chiefs from neighboring cities, two citizens, and a Department Head from Windcrest. That team screened the applicants and then conducted interviews. The result will be a recommendation to the Council. The Council will then probably conduct their own interviews and make a decision. I would expect that process to be completed early in May. In the meantime, Interim Police Chief David Ellis is doing a fine job keeping the police department headed forward.

Windcrest International Business Park – That project is moving forward. There was a delay because of some challenges with a major sub-contractor. A new sub-contractor is coming on board, and we expect the progress to continue. The pace of the project has been slower than we would have desired, but the fact that we have someone in the building after the sudden departure of Rackspace is a big win for Windcrest. There is positive movement on some of the other pad sites on that property. Just south of the property, Burger Boy is nearing completion.

FY 25/26 Budget – Your City Staff began the process of drafting a budget for FY 25/26 in March. There are going to be some challenges. With the departure of Rackspace, our sales tax revenue dropped significantly. The relatively short time frame it took to get a new owner was very encouraging, but it is going to take some time to rebuild the revenues. It is not just the Rackspace property; sales taxes are down across the board. I'm confident that with the development of the Rackspace (now ICP) property, we will rebound, but it will take time. The staff and the City Council have always been diligent with your taxpayer dollars, and this year will be no different; it will just be a little leaner than normal. We will continue to provide plenty of opportunities for citizen input into the budget. I hope everyone is enjoying all the beautiful blooming flowers. While everyone is out working in the yard, please keep in mind to remove any clutter that snakes may be able to hide underneath. Reminder to also clean your backyard. I encourage everyone to cut their grass and keep the bushes trimmed off the roadways and sidewalks. If you have not done so, fine tune your mowers and other tools necessary for keeping up with your property. Please keep up with lawn maintenance, pool maintenance, alley improvements and tree trimming. Also check on all fencing and gates leading into your swimming pools.

If you missed brush pickup! You are responsible for the disposal of excess materials. Reminder, residential garbage, waste, and refuse placed outside for pickup shall be stored in a durable metal or hardened rubber container with a tightly sealed insect-proof and animal-proof lid. The only trash bags allowed on the curb are for the disposal of leaves, grass trimmings or other items. NO food-based products please. Reminder: It is illegal to blow your leaves onto the street and leave them there.

A MESSAGE FROM Fire inspector, tim zelenak

The popularity of electric bikes and electric-scooters (E-Bikes and E-Scooters) has taken off over the past few years. Lithium-ion batteries are usually the source of power for both, and if not used correctly, or if damaged, these batteries can catch fire or explode. Whether you use E-Bikes or E-Scooters as your main form of transportation or just for fun, there are important safety tips to keep in mind when charging or storing these devices.

The Problem:

- Damaged or defective batteries can overheat, catch fire or possibly explode.
- Lithium-ion battery fires give off toxic gases and they burn extremely hot.

Safety Tips:

- Only purchase and use devices, batteries, and charging equipment that are listed by a nationally recognized testing laboratory and labeled accordingly.
- Always follow the instructions from the manufacturer.
- Only use the battery and the charger that were designed for, and came with, the device.
- Do not keep charging the device or device battery after it is fully charged.
- Only charge one device or device battery at a time to prevent overloading the circuit.
- Keep batteries at room temperature when possible. Do not charge them at temperatures below 32° F or above 105° F.
- Do not store batteries in direct sunlight or inside hot vehicles and keep them away from children and liquids.
- Store E-Bikes, E-Scooters and batteries away from exit doors and anything that can get hot or catch fire.
- Only have device repairs performed by qualified professionals.
- Do not put lithium-ion batteries in the trash. Recycling is always the best option.

Signs of a Problem:

• Stop using the E-Bike or E-Scooter if you notice any of these problems with the battery: unusual odor, change in color, too much heat, change in shape, leaking, smoking or not keeping a charge.

What is National Police Week?



In 1962, President Kennedy proclaimed May 15 as National Peace Officers Memorial Day and the calendar week in which May 15 falls, as National Police Week. Established by a joint resolution of Congress in 1962, National Police Week pays special

recognition to those law enforcement officers who have lost their lives in the line of duty for the safety and protection of others.

The Windcrest Police Department will be holding a ceremony on Thursday, May 15th. We will post the details of the event on our Facebook Page as we get closer. We hope to see everyone there.

As of this writing, April 4th, 2025, in the United States we have had 19 Line of Duty Deaths. Last year we had 165. Over the last 5 years we have had 1,805. Over the last 10 years 2,709. And we have had 26,935 Line of Duty Deaths for all time. The source of this information comes from the Officer Down Memorial Page located at https://www.odmp.org/.

Just as a reminder, the primary causes of vehicle break-ins are vehicles being left unlocked and leaving valuables in a vehicle that are in plain sight. Fire Safety Myths: Separating Fact from Fiction

At the Windcrest Fire Department, keeping you safe is our top priority. Unfortunately, there are many myths about fire safety that can put you and your loved ones at risk. Let's clear up some common misconceptions and make sure everyone is prepared in case of an emergency.

Myth #1: "If there's a fire, I have plenty of time to escape."

Fact: A fire can spread rapidly, leaving you with only two minutes or less to get out safely. Always have an escape plan, practice it regularly, and ensure that everyone in your home knows what to do.

Myth #2: "Smoke alarms only need to be checked when they beep."

Fact: If your smoke alarm is beeping, it's already too late—it means the battery is low or the alarm has detected smoke. Test your alarms once a month and replace the batteries at least once a year to ensure they are always working.

Myth #3: "Water can put out all types of fires."

Fact: Water can make some fires worse, especially grease and electrical fires. If a grease fire starts, turn off the heat and cover the pan with a lid. For an electrical fire, unplug the device if safe to do so and use a Class C fire extinguisher.

Myth #4: "Fire sprinklers will flood my entire home if triggered."

Fact: Fire sprinklers are designed to activate individually, meaning only the sprinkler closest to the fire will go off. This helps contain the fire quickly while minimizing water damage.

Stay Fire-Smart!

Fire safety starts with awareness and preparedness. Take time this month to review your emergency plans, check your smoke alarms, and teach your family what to do in case of a fire.

TRAP: Humane traps

STERILIZE: Take the cats in their traps to a veterinarian or clinic to be spayed or neutered, vaccinated, and ear-tipped.

RETURN: After the cats have recovered from surgery, return them to their outdoor homes where they were trapped.

Trap-Neuter-Return is the humane and effective approach for stray and feral cats. Now in practice for decades in the US, after being proven in Europe, scientific studies show that Trap-Neuter-Return improves the lives of feral/community cats, improves their relationships with the people who live near them, and decreases the size of colonies over time. That's why the number of municipalities that officially endorse this approach increased tenfold between 2003 and 2013. Grounded in science, TNR stops the breeding cycle of cats and therefore improves their lives. It is a fact that the removal and killing of outdoor cats is not effective. Since feral cats are not adoptable, they are killed in pounds and shelters. Windcrest adopted the TNR program in 2009. Since then, more and more people have stepped up to be a part of that solution by offering to be cat caregivers. That means monitoring the group of cats by making sure they have food and proper care. It is spending time and resources to trap, transporting the cat to a clinic for the sterilization & rabies shot and then providing the care necessary while the cat recovers. After recovery, the cat returns to its area where trapped.

And we have another hero story!!! One of our members moved to a new community and through her efforts, started a TNR group who is now trapping in her new neighborhood.....more cats are cared for and have a much better life. Always good to know there are folks out there that care!!

The words below written by Lieutenant-Colonel (LTC) John McCrae, a Canadian physician during First World War (WWI) still echo in the hearts of millions around the world. His poem, "In Flanders Fields", has now not only become one of the most quoted poems but has also given rise to the poppy as a symbol of the sacrifices of Service Members.


The vibrant red poppy takes center stage in this poem, in the backdrop of a war-torn Europe, from the voices of Allied Soldiers who paid the ultimate sacrifice. The imagery of the poppy growing amongst the graves of our fallen quickly became a popular symbol in the early 1920's.

In the United States the poppy is traditionally worn on the Friday before Memorial Day, which is National Poppy Day, to honor the fallen and support veterans.
